### TRACK AND TRACE

### Changes to self- isolation for household contacts (fully vaccinated and children aged five to 17)

### Key messages:

If someone in your <u>household</u> has symptoms of coronavirus or has tested positive:

If you are fully vaccinated or under 18 (with the exception of children aged 0 – 4)

You must self-isolate and take a PCR test. If your test is negative you can stop isolating.

#### • If you are not fully vaccinated and 18 or older

You must self isolate for 10 days. You should get a PCR test on day 2 and day 8 even if these are negative you must continue to isolate for the full 10 days.

• If you are a child under 5

If you are under 5 you do not have to isolate or take a test if you have been a contact of a positive case – household or other.

### **Frequently asked Questions**

#### Q. When does the change come into force?

A. As of 29 October 2021, self-isolation advice and guidance has changed if somebody in your household has coronavirus symptoms or has tested positive for coronavirus.

#### Q. Is it advice or a legal requirement?

A. Household contacts (fully vaccinated adults or aged between 5 to 17) should be advised to take a PCR test and to self-isolate until receiving a negative result. It is not a legal requirement but contacts should nevertheless be strongly advised to follow the guidance.

#### Q. When should they be advised to take the PCR test?

A. As soon as possible.

#### Q. Are we still advising a day 8 PCR test?

A. No, not for household contacts (fully vaccinated adults or aged between 5 to 17)

#### Q. What if they tested positive within past 90 days?

- A. Household contacts who tested positive within the last 90 days should be advised to take an LFD test rather than a PCR and to isolate until they've got a negative result.
- Q. If a person has symptoms, it is likely the household will go and get tested together. Will they then need to retest after the symptomatic person gets the positive result.
- A. Yes
- Q. What about children that are split across two parental homes, blanket applies to all or look at when they were last in one home over infectious period?
- A. Blanket applies to all.

# Q. Is the guidance on *ly* for household contacts? What about close contacts? (eg Sexual partners or friends who spent overnight or considerable time within the household)

A. Only household contacts.

#### Q. Where can I get the PCR required and how quickly can I get hold of one?

A. PCRs should be booked on CTM portal in usual way and are readily available.

#### Q. What happen if someone refuses to take a PCR test?

A. Contact tracers should strongly encourage contacts to take the PCR test following the normal procedure but if someone refuses a note on the CRM is sufficient.

#### **Q. Can HH contacts leave isolation to get a PCR test?**

A. Yes.

## **Q.** If the household contacts do not go for a PCR for whatever reason do they isolate for the full 10 days?

A. No it's ultimately advice to go for a PCR and to isolate until the result. Legally they are exempt from isolation.

#### Q. Do we still advise secondary school pupils to take 7 day LFDs?

A. Yes – this would be in addition to being advised to take an immediate PCR test and to isolate until a negative result.

## Q. Are we anticipating any change of guidance to special schools or Health and social care?

A. No. In general H&SC and special schools are already applying this change.

# Q. If a child under 5 is symptomatic but not tested as per recommendations what should those HH contacts be advised to do?

A. They are not required to isolate or advised to take a PCR test.

#### Q. Can children under 5 still attend nursery/childcare setting if a HH contact?

A. Yes – there are no changes to the advice concerning under 5 household contacts. Under 5s should not attend nursery/childcare setting if they are symptomatic or unwell.

#### Q. If HH contact is a family carer can they leave isolation to carry out duties?

A. No they should isolate until they received a negative test result.

#### Q. How are the household contacts released from isolation?

A. Household contacts are released from isolation on receipt of negative test result. They do not need confirmation from TTP.

#### Q. Are we adding to tracer scripts as well as advisor ones?

A. Yes. Both tracer and advisor scripts will be updated as soon as possible.

# Q. If household contacts are in work when we speak to them, should we be asking them to come straight home and take a test?

A. Yes.

#### Q. What about self-isolation payments if they only isolate for a day or two?

A. There are no changes to self-isolation payments at this stage. Therefore being asked to isolate for a day or two will not impact on the scheme.

#### Q. How should these cases be resolved on the CRM?

A. For the time being these cases should be treated as exempt from isolation in the usual way.
